History of the FiberMax Center for Discovery

More than fifty years ago, a handful of Lubbock's civic leaders, including Alton Brazell, recognized the region's agricultural heritage was slipping away.

In 1969, the Lubbock County Commissioners Court gave Brazell the authority to begin collecting machinery that was part of the technological transformation taking place on South Plains farms. The tractors, combines, plows, drills, and thousands of other farm-related artifacts became the Lubbock County Historical Collection.

In 2001, a non-profit group organized to assume responsibility and administration of the Lubbock County Historical Collection. They incorporated as the American Museum of Agriculture. In 2003, the Museum contracted with the City of Lubbock to lease a beautiful 24.87-acre tract just east of downtown and adjacent to Mackenzie Park. This prime site afforded ample space for expansion and a stunning view of the downtown skyline. It would allow the museum to interpret and showcase its tremendous collection in both outdoor and indoor settings.

In 2008, the museum finalized contract agreements with the City of Lubbock by meeting the City's goal of raising \$1 million toward the building project. The City granted the Museum a 50-year lease on the land with a 49-year option to renew. With the help of the Helen Jones Foundation and several donors, the first gallery, Alton Brazell Hall was open to the public in 2011.

With a major gift from Bayer CropScience and FiberMax, a second phase was completed in 2014, which added a central exhibit hall, conference center, catering kitchen, general store, and patio. Phase II allowed the facility to host groups from across the country. With each rental came the opportunity to tell the story of agriculture to a new audience.

In 2020, with the continued support of FiberMax, now a part of BASF, we became the FiberMax Center for Discovery, where we celebrate agriculture's heritage, education, and innovation.

Our name recognizes more than a decade-long relationship with FiberMax Cotton and came with their financial support, an upgraded FiberMax exhibit and brought us one step closer to an agricultural literacy wing, AgWorks.

What started as the Lubbock County Historical Collection has grown to encompass 24 acres, more than 35,000 square feet of exhibit space, three holograms, a cotton stripper simulator, and multiple touch screens and interactives. Our facility is a place where people can engage, create, share, and connect with agriculture, and hopefully, always discover something new. Thus, it is a center for discovery.

Under Construction: PHASE III



The future is now and it's under construction. On June 1, we put golden shovels in the ground and turned dirt. While this small action might have been ceremonial, it represents nearly a decade of fundraising, planning, and promoting.

Phase III construction will take 14 months to complete and will open in late summer/fall of 2024. At the heart of the new addition is AgWorks, a children's agricultural literacy wing, which will be named for Craig and Ann McDonald, the lead donors in a large group of people committed to agriculture education.

This hands-on space, focused on 4th grade and below, is a place where children, parents, and grandparents can come together and learn where their food and fiber comes from and make a connection back to the producers. An irrigation water table, a crop cycle exhibit, a large animal vet clinic and animal barn, a silo climber and slide, and a cotton processing area are a few of the highlights in this 5,000 square feet gallery.

There is also a theme of careers in agriculture, opening children's minds and imaginations to opportunities in the industry. From truck drivers to food scientists, career mentor stations can be found in each exhibit area. We've been fortunate to work with RedBox Workshop, expert children's exhibit designers out of Chicago to make the new wing fun, functional, and safe for families and school groups.

The Hurst Family joined the McDonalds in making the largest gift in our organization's history, making Phase III a reality. While AgWorks will bear the McDonalds name, the Central Exhibit Hall will be renamed Hurst Hall in recognition of the generosity of Joe, Christy, Terry, and Sheri Hurst.

Phase III also adds the Taylor Cotton Heritage Center, sponsored by Dan and Linda Taylor, a unique space for a unique crop. We are working with Mix Design out of Indiana to design this area. Mix Design has worked on agricultural exhibits at Fair Oaks Farms, multiple state fairs, and oversaw the redesign of Texas Farm Bureau's mobile learning unit, entitled Doorways to Texas Agriculture.

With a little creativity and brainstorming with MWM Architects, the Cotton Heritage Center gave us the chance to bring another project to fruition, the historic 1875 Goodman Cotton Gin. We had long discussed moving the structure to our site from behind the National Ranching Heritage Center. Better yet, by building a 10

ft pit in the center of the gallery, we will relocate the two-story structure inside the new building. Year round, rain or snow, visitors will be able to walk through a nearly 150-year-old cotton gin, and see the unique animal-powered bale press and gin stand.


The gin has been carefully disassembled and stored at our facility. Alex and Jesse Webb with Webb Joinery out of Virginia will begin its reconstruction in September. We will then build the rest of our building around it, protecting and showcasing it for generations to come. We especially want to thank the Committee for Cotton Research, Samuel Jackson Incorporated, and all of our local cotton gins, who made the Goodman Gin Project possible.

In addition to children's exhibits and cotton heritage center, Phase III adds the Garrison Gallery for rotating exhibits, the Dale and Debbie Taylor Family Corral, the Jackson Bridal Suite, an archives and research room, additional meeting space, and more restrooms. Don't let all the names deter you though. There are still plenty of opportunities for your business or family to sponsor an exhibit in the new wing.

Bios:

Dr. Tedd Mitchell, Keynote Speaker

Tedd L. Mitchell, M.D., was named the fifth chancellor of the Texas Tech University System on Oct. 28, 2018. As chancellor, Mitchell is the CEO of a nearly \$3 billion, five-university higher education enterprise consisting of Texas Tech University, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, Angelo State University, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso and Midwestern State University.



Collectively, the TTU System enrolls approximately 63,000 students, has an endowment valued at more than \$1.7 billion, has an annual statewide economic impact of \$16.4 billion and operates at 26 academic locations in 22 cities across the state and internationally.

Mitchell works collaboratively with the TTU System Board of Regents, TTU System Administration and component university presidents to enhance the TTU System's profile and support shared missions of advancing higher education, health care, research and community outreach.

Mitchell was instrumental in securing the partnership with MSU Texas, which officially joined TTU System on Sept. 1, 2021, following the 87th Texas legislative session. Historic milestones were achieved under Mitchell's leadership in 2019 during the 86th Texas Legislature, when legislative support and approval was provided to establish the TTU School of Veterinary Medicine in Amarillo and the Woody L. Hunt School of Dental Medicine at TTUHSC El Paso. These achievements marked the state's first veterinary school in more than a century and the first dental school in Texas in more than 50 years. Both programs finished their first academic year in Spring 2022.

He and his wife, Janet Tornelli-Mitchell, M.D., have three children and two grandchildren. Having served as our emcee in 2022, we welcome Chancellor Mitchell back as our 2023 keynote speaker.

Curtis Parrish, Lubbock County Judge, Master of Ceremonies

Curtis Parrish's family roots run deep in the cotton fields of West Texas. He is a fifth generation West Texan. He attended LCU and Texas Tech, graduating Magna Cum Laude with a political science degree.

Parrish spent 16 years in Lubbock media as an assistant news director and chief photographer. He is the former co-host of "West Texas Today" on AM950/100.7FM, and legal analyst for Fox34 News at Nine. He is a long-time announcer for Red Raider Football, and other Texas Tech sports.

He received his law degree from Texas Tech, worked for Senator Duncan and served as the committee clerk for the Texas House Juvenile Justice and Family Issues Committee.



Parrish was elected Lubbock County Judge in 2018, serving as the probate, guardianship, and mental health judge for Lubbock County, and presiding over the Commissioners Court.



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
